## Tournament Facts and Statistics

The following players won singles and doubles gold in their age bracket:

- Tang Bing (CHN) Men's 40-49
- Le Van Inh (AUS) Men's 70-74
- Shen Shih Hsiung (TPE) Men's 85+
- Yumi Sahara (JPN) Women's 40-49
- Larisa Andreeva (RUS) Women's 60-64
- Akiko Ikeda (JPN) Women's 75-79

Japan's domination of the women's events saw their players take two thirds of the gold medals, and 57% of the women's medals on offer. Japan medalled in every women's event at the championships!

The oldest contestant present was Inge-Brigette Hermmann (GER), 92 years

Number of matches played was **5256** (58% men, 42% women), this is more than double Tokyo 2014 senior World Team Championships matches played (2574 in Tokyo)
